Seeking input when making choices has become the norm for this generation, now they are extending this behaviour to parenting

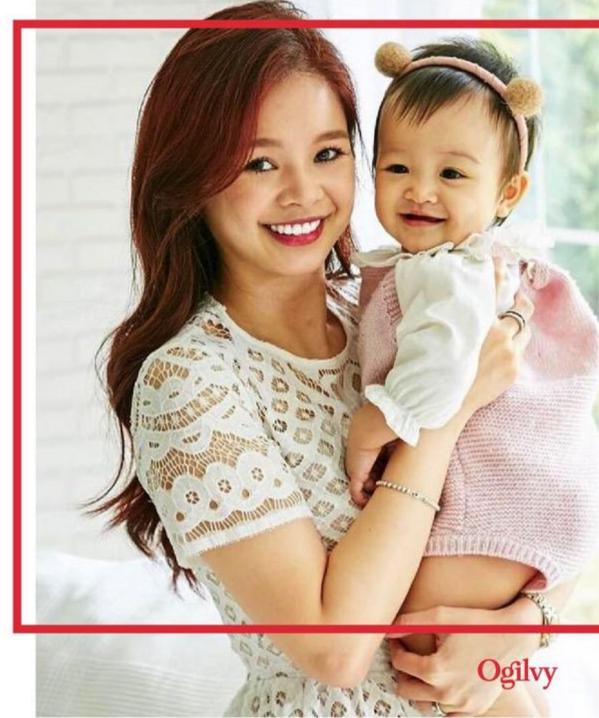


FEWER OFFLINE FRIENDS, AND DITCHING FRIENDS WHO DON'T HAVE KIDS,

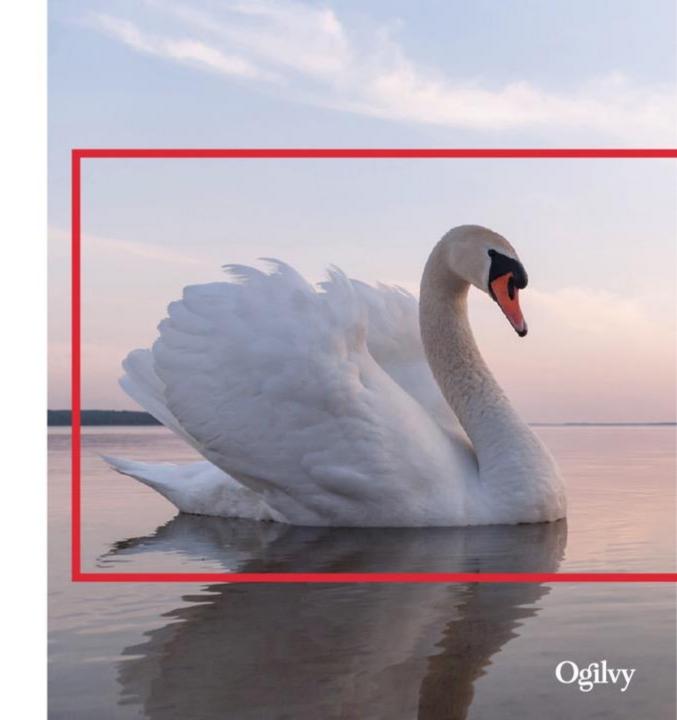
THE BEST OF ME FOR THE WORLD TO SEE

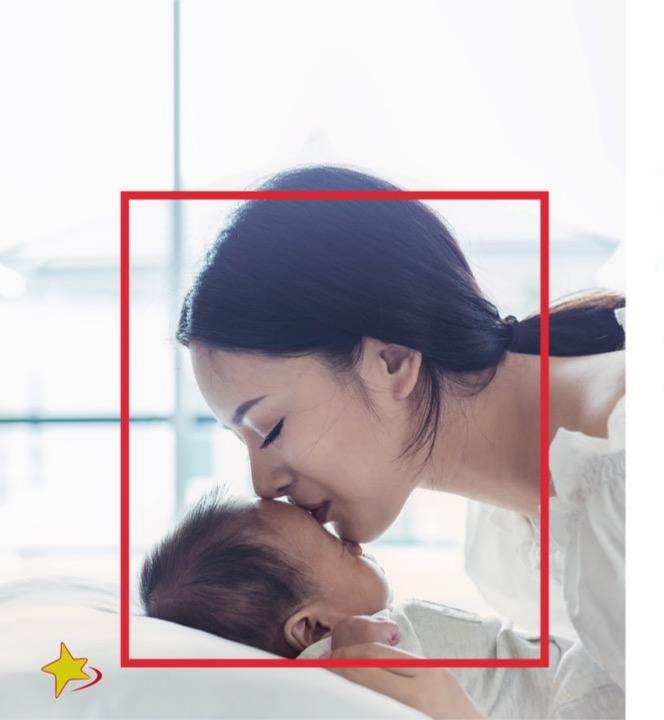
The WHITE SWAN SYNDROME

ONLINE SHOPPING HAS ITS ROLE BUT SO HAS BABY FAIRS

Brick & Mortar is preferred for one time high value products where physical experience and touch & feel is important. Online for high frequency, low involvement categories

For the big stuff, we went to baby fairs. My husband did a lot of online research into all those gadgets, like the buggy and the car seat, but really, you need to touch them and feel them.

THE RISE OF EQ AS THE MOST DESIRABLE TRAIT IN CHILDREN

Success of kids is no longer driven by IQ or academic success alone. Mums now want their children to be successful on their own terms.

It's not so much about getting straight As. If they are able to contribute to society and they are happy doing what they are doing, then I have done a good job.

Socialisation leads to an ability to face problems and then to more success as an adult. Our kids need to learn that in life you can't get everything that you want.







CODES OF PARENTING CHANGING FROM

AUTHORITATIVE TO POSITIVE

- Recognition that the child should have some input into the decision making
- Explaining rather than punishing, allowing child to make some decisions, even if they are wrong

I still use the rotan (cane) on my children, but unlike my father, I will try to explain to them what they did and that this is the consequence.

I will let my kids choose what they want to be when they grow up, as long as it legal. I don't want to force my kids like my parents did.

RETHINKING UPBRINGING FOR AMBIGUOUS TIMES

- Less structure and more desire for play and "well socialised" kids
- Resilient kids, and the need to feel failure

It's important that my kids get that kampung experience, and play with their cousins in the dirt with the chickens. Of course they may fall over or get dirty but that's an important part of childhood.

When I send my kids to different classes and activities. It's not so much about what they learn, it's about being with other kids and learning how to socialise.

ABOUT GENDER AND RACE

- Gender neutral toys and games
- Less focus on race

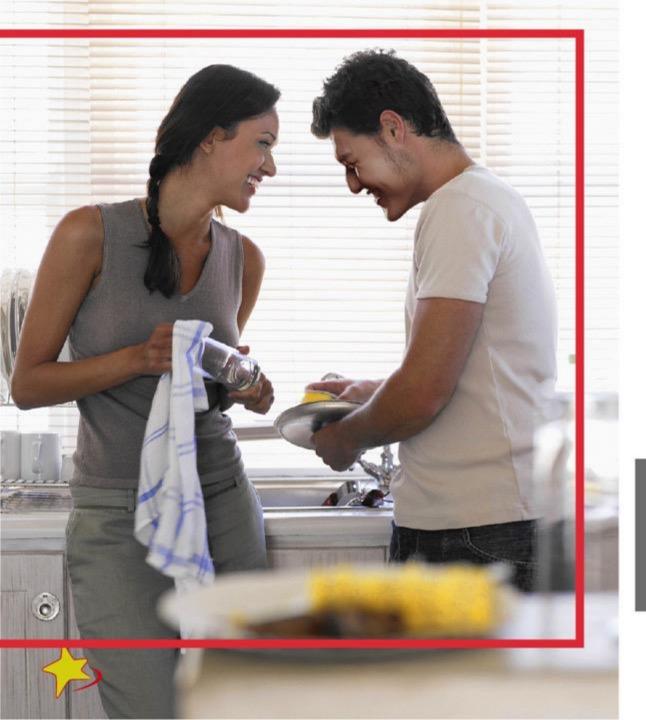
Even though I have a son, I bought this cooking set for him. I don't want him to be limited to just traditional boys toys like cars. It's better if he has both.

When my child says 'this Indian uncle' I always correct her and say 'he's just an uncle. It doesn't matter if he's Indian, Malay or Chinese.







CHANGING IDEAS ABOUT FAMILY AND GENDER ROLES AT HOME

- Not about who should do it, but about who can do it best
- Role of Dad in childcare is increasing, especially in Malay families (e.g. putting the kids to bed)

My father doesn't even know how to boil water, my mother did everything. For me, I can't remember the last time I did laundry. My husband takes care of that.

STEREOTYPE

Always hungry for information and ask google everything

CONSTANT FLOW OF INFORMATION HAS HONED HER ABILITY TO CANCEL THE NOISE

In communications this has led to a more honed ability to filter out the constructed and the fake.

This extends to other sources of information



SHE SETTLES FOR SIMPLIFIED SHORTHAND

While communicators go for long hand elaborate messages, she uses simplified shorthand filters. "Free from", "free range", "natural" etc becomes organic/natural/healthy.







SHE SEES THROUGH PLASTIC PERFECT...AND RESONATES WITH REAL STRUGGLES.

REAL EXPERIENCES.

- Actual experience is more authentic than an expert telling someone what to do
- Recognising my imperfections acknowledging and accepting that motherhood is not about being perfect but about being 'good enough'

Back then I knew everything that was going on in the world, I was really well informed. Now I know nothing, and I only watch cartoons.

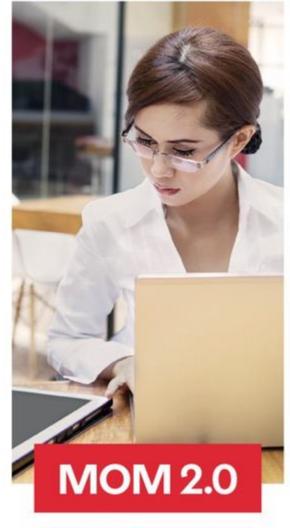

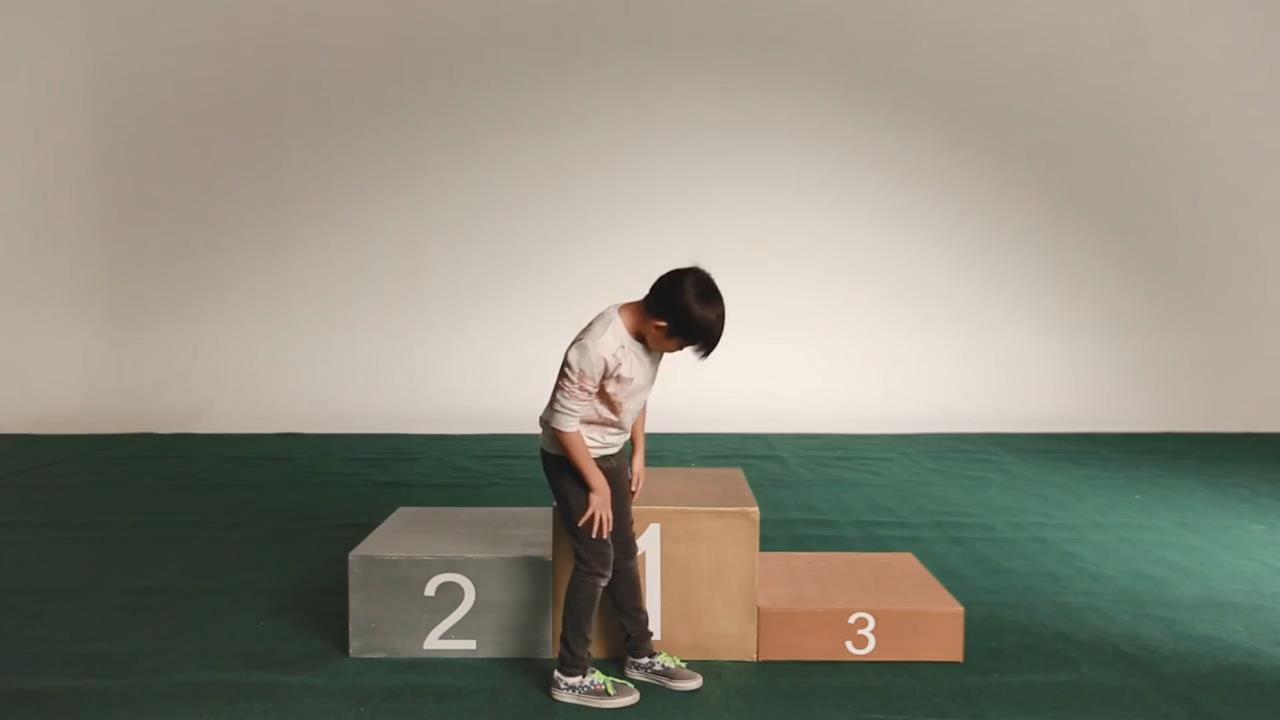
